

## How to Cite Internet Sources—APA (American Psychological Association) Style

If you cannot find all of the suggested information, cite what you do find in the recommended order.

- Examples are single-spaced; DOUBLE SPACE citations in your reference list.
- Journal title and volume numbers are placed in italics.

TYPE	FORMAT *Indent lines following the first line of the citation 5 to 7 spaces.	EXAMPLE
<b>WEB SITE</b> Citing an entire Web site	If you reference an entire Web site (rather than a specific document on the site), you may just give the address (URL) in the text. No references entry is needed.	<b>In the text of your paper, cite like this:</b> Kidpsych is a wonderful interactive Web site for children ( <a href="http://www.kidpsych.org">http://www.kidpsych.org</a> ).
<b>WEB PAGE</b> An article from an online journal	Author. (date of article). Article title. <i>Journal Title</i> , vol. (issue), pages.	Jacobsen, J. W. (2010). A history of facilitated communication. <i>American Psychologist</i> , 50(2), 750-752. Retrieved from <a href="http://www.apa.org/journals/jacobsen.html">http://www.apa.org/journals/jacobsen.html</a>
		<b>In the text of your paper, cite like this:</b> Effective communication is important to build a relationship with the community (Jacobson, 2010). According to Jacobson (2010), it is important to build a relationship with the community.
<b>WEB PAGE</b> An article from an online newspaper	Author. (Year, Month Day). Article title. <i>Newspaper Title</i> . URL.	Pear, R. (2003, January 2). Gains reported for children of welfare to work families. <i>The New York Times on the Web</i> . Retrieved from <a href="http://www.nytimes.com/2003/01/2/WELF.html">http://www.nytimes.com/2003/01/2/WELF.html</a> .
		<b>In the text of your paper, cite like this:</b> Welfare to work programs continue to show progress (Pear, 2003). According to Pear (2003), welfare to work programs are showing progress.
<b>E-MAIL, PERSONAL COMMUNICATION, OR CLASSROOM LECTURE</b>	Treat as a personal communication. Do not cite in the reference list.	<b>In the text of your paper, cite like this:</b> D. A. Wax, freelance writer, said, “As we improve our writing ability, we improve our ability to think” (personal communication, January 3, 2013).
<b>NON-PERIODICAL</b>	Author. (Year, Month Day). Article title. URL.	Byrd, M. (2000, March 2). <i>Disaster management: Lost innocents</i> . Retrieved from <a href="http://www.crime-scene-investigator.net/disaster.html">http://www.crime-scene-investigator.net/disaster.html</a>
	Author and date of publication is unknown: Article title. URL.	<i>The history of fingerprints</i> . (n.d.). Retrieved from <a href="http://onin.com/fp/fphistory.html">http://onin.com/fp/fphistory.html</a>
		<b>In the text of your paper, cite like this:</b> An individual’s fingerprints never change (“The History,” n.d.).
